Drugstore Cowboys: Understanding the Nature and Extent of Pharmacy Robbery

Aspirin for Primary Prevention: New Guidelines, Old Controversy

(1.5 Credit Hours Disease State Management/Drug Therapy)

Prevention of heart attack and stroke remain key goals in primary care. Optimizing pharmacotherapy remains a primary strategy for pharmacists in trying to achieve that goal. The use of antiplatelet therapy for primary prevention remains controversial. A recent update to the USPSTF (United States Preventive Services Taskforce) guidelines on the use of aspirin for primary prevention substantially changed the previous recommendations from 2009. This program will review the key data which has historically defined the benefit and risk of antiplatelet monotherapy in primary prevention and discuss the application of the new guidelines to clinical practice in 2017.

- Quantify the risk and benefit of aspirin for primary prevention
- Outline the position of major organizations including the USFDA regarding the use of aspirin for primary prevention

Seismic Upgrade for the Opioid Paradigm Shift

(1.5 Credit Hours Disease State Management/Drug Therapy)

Increased awareness of opioid safety concerns over the last decade has culminated in the publication of the CDC Guideline for Prescribing Opioids for Chronic Pain. This paradigm shift in how we think of opioid therapy necessitates a re-evaluation of chronic pain management treatment plans and some potentially difficult conversations. This presentation offers suggestions for where opioids fit in the management of chronic pain, how to have the conversation with patients about the paradigm shift and how to successfully taper higher doses of opioids while detailing a thoughtful pain management plan to the individual patient.

Managing Challenges with Oral Antineoplastics - Cancer is Tough Enough!

(1.5 Credit Hours Disease State Management/Drug Therapy)

This session will review several concepts that all pharmacists should know when monitoring, counseling and providing care to patients on oral antineoplastic agents. New challenges present for pharmacists as more patients are receiving oral oncolytic agents as part of their treatment. During this lecture, common oral agents’ clinical pearls, drug interactions, hazardous drug handling and supportive care for patients with cancer will be reviewed.

- Describe standard precautions every pharmacy staff member must take when handling an oral chemotherapy medication
- Given a patient case, list at least two resources or references a pharmacist may use to determine if a chemotherapeutic agent may interact with the patient’s other medications
- Given a patient case, recommend at least two patient counseling points on how a chemotherapy medication should be handled, stored, and administered by the patient and/or caregiver
- Identify common side effects for the oral oncolytic agents that are presented
- Properly counsel patients on supportive therapies to reduce complications from oral oncolytic agents
